GREETINGS FROM YOUR NEW COMMODORE!

I appreciate the opportunity to serve you, and hope that we can all work together to make 1986 a banner year for LBYC.

Your governing board deliberated at length on the budget for the coming year, and we finally decided that the only way to meet our needs and goals was to raise the dues to \$200 per year. We also set the initiation fees at \$500 for family memberships, and \$350 for associate memberships (available for singles only) with five of each being anticipated in the budget. The increased dues was necessary because of increased expenses, such as insurance costs, and our hosting Race Week next summer, but allows minimal amounts in other areas. It is our hope that with everyone working together to show prospective new members what our club has to offer, we can exceed the number of new members included in the budget and provide more revenue for other areas - such as capital improvements, building and grounds, and bond retirement fund.

LBYC has come far in its first four years, under the leadership of the previous Commodores, and there are many things of which we can be proud our sailors have done well in competition, our Juniors program is active and successful, and we have one of the finest yacht club buildings in the area. It is time now to consolidate our gains, and to move ahead to bigger and better things in the future.


